Members and guests of SSW considered "What a truly sustainable food system would be like" at our annual sustainability summit in Dartmouth last week.

There was a cross sector consensus that if we continue to produce and consume food as we are now we risk being unable to feed ourselves because we are increasing dangerous climate change and damaging and wasting the natural resources on which we depend for survival. So Sustainability South West is calling for:

- Consumers and food producers to wield more power over our food supplies
- A move away from large retailers setting the agenda
- A complete re-valuing of healthy food production as an essential ingredient that keeps our vital life support systems going.

Our current approach to food is fast becoming a recipe for disaster. We need stronger leadership to overturn our short sighted approach to food production and consumption. If we are going to be resilient to the huge 21st century challenges of climate change and population growth we must all learn how to be far more eco - efficient in the way we produce, distribute and consume food. We have a reputation for good local food in the South West – now is the time to develop this legacy to help us to - literally - grow ourselves a more sustainable future.

Our region has developed some excellent examples that support local communities and producers through sustainable production and procurement schemes by organisations including The Cornwall NHS Trust and The National Trust. We know that personal involvement with the production of food even at the simplest level can significantly improve our physical and mental and wellbeing. So dig for sustainability“!

NB: Sustainability South West will be preparing recommendations in liaison with other organisations across the region to respond to a new government consultation on a national sustainable food policy expected later in the year. New Training Opportunity 23 July, Bristol: An Introduction to Sustainability

Sustainability South West is now offering accredited courses for members of Local Strategic Partnerships (LSPs) and local government officers.



The new half-day course, 'Introduction to Sustainability' introduces the basics of sustainability and the sustainability appraisal process. The course aims to demystify sustainability and provide practical experience and hands-on training for undertaking a sustainability appraisal in a real life strategy, plan or work programme. The training is suitable for anyone who works in local government and with LSPs and is CPD accredited. Free follow up support and advice is also included.

This is the first in a catalogue of accredited courses and workshops that SSW will offer to local authorities and other public and private sector organisations.

Natural England urges decision-makers

Working with nature is vital to climate change adaptation Natural England has responded to the latest Government climate change forecasts by highlighting the urgent need to support the natural environment to adapt to climatic changes. Whilst new technologies may be part of the solution, we must not overlook the role of our natural assets in moderating greenhouse gases - such as in the case of the UK's peat bogs, which operate as a vast carbon store. Natural England's Character Area Climate Change Project has identified the particular adaptation needs of four treasured English landscapes including the woodland and chalk grassland of the Dorset Downs and Cranborne Chase - which are predicted to resemble Portugal by 2080 - is one of the featured areas.

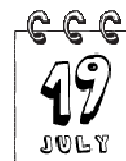
TUC Green action at work camp
