'Laissez Faire' – green and fair?

'The Big Society' demands DIY localism in a new 'Age of Austerity.' But will all this lead us to a more sustainable future?

The switch to an economically and environmentally viable and socially-just future will need a systemic approach. The transition from relentlessly damaging consumption patterns and growing inequalities, to a preventative approach to ill health and a fair shares approach to managing our limited resources (which respects the needs of future generations) requires a change of direction.



Change in challenging times requires strong, visionary leadership. Whilst people can be cramped by too prescriptive an approach, we need a shared vision and a holistic overall framework based on sound sustainability principles to guide the way ahead and offer measures of real progress.

A hands-off 'Laissez Fair' approach offers no such grounding. And – whether based on naive optimism that things will simply 'work themselves out' or general indifference – is simply weak leadership.

We await the Government's new Localism Bill with interest. Sustainability South West will be looking for news of the preparation of an overall principles-based sustainability framework, to guide the efforts of the thousands of individuals and organisations who could cultivate 'the common good'.

The awards recognise the input of these spaces in supporting healthy, sustainable communities and acknowledge the people who work to make them special. Any public greenspace in the South West of England can be nominated for an award; everything from parks, community gardens and allotments to green routes (ie cycle paths), playing fields and even cemeteries and rooftops. The greenspace can be privately funded, NHS Trust, community, conservation group or council land, but it must be free and accessible to the public, and for public use and enjoyment.

This year, ten 'top example' winners will be chosen, highlighting how local greenspace can have a positive impact on local communities. 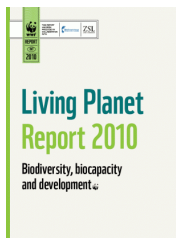
Free HR consultancy service for two social enterprises, apply now

LGA climate change survey

A new Local Government Association report summarises local authority activity on climate change and estimates the resources and support required to keep momentum going. Of the authorities who took part in the survey around two thirds had a climate change strategy/action plan whilst 80 per cent had established a portfolio holder for climate change. The future capacity of councils to advance their work around climate change is questioned, with two-fifths of respondents expecting a decline in available budgets. 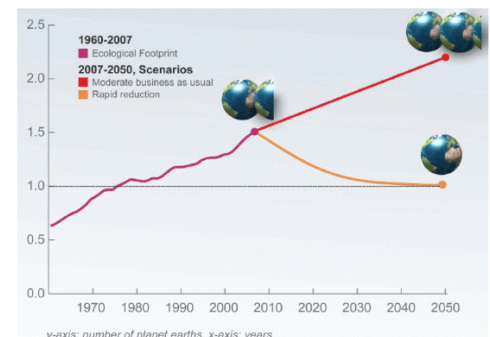
Living Planet Report 2010



The 2010 Living Planet Report has revealed that humanity is using nature's services 50% faster than the Earth can renew. Humanity's Ecological Footprint has more than doubled since 1966; in just 40 years, humanity is using the equivalent

of 1.5 planets to support its activities. Based on UN projections for population growth, consumption and climate change, by 2030 humanity will need the capacity of two Earths to absorb carbon dioxide waste and keep up with natural resource consumption. However the report, produced by WWF in collaboration with Global Footprint Network and the Zoological Society of London, also presents scenarios based on actions that could change the curve, as well as the outlook if we remain on our current course.

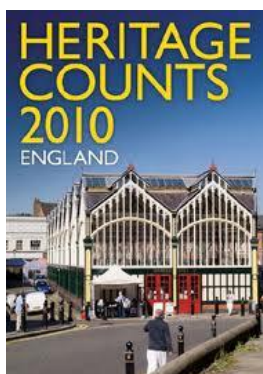
Grant funding available in Weymouth & Portland

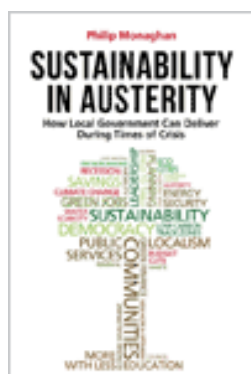


Heritage Counts 2010

Bristol City Council 'Wild City' Grant to work with local people in deprived areas of Bristol to access and enjoy the natural environment in creative and innovative ways.

BTCV 'Young Carers Project' Grant to give young carers respite from usual caring responsibilities by involving them in habitat and public access improvement activities on urban and rural sites within Somerset, Wiltshire and the Avon area.

 **UK 'bored' of climate change** Flights and waste increase as the recession effects consumer motivation. The assessment of implementing the Commission's Biodiversity Action Plan shows that Europe's biodiversity remains under severe threat from the excessive demands we are making on our environment, such as changes in land use, pollution, invasive species and climate change. Nevertheless, the assessment reveals that significant progress has been made over the last two years. 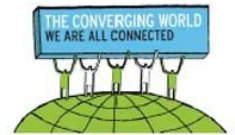
