What's on the cards for Copenhagen?

As climate change negotiations start in Copenhagen this week (COP15), everything depends on leaders agreeing a deal on climate change that is both radical and fair. But what is a fair amount of carbon for UK citizens to be using? Our ongoing climate campaign Fair Shares, Fair Choice (FSFC) has calculated that your 'climate safe' and 'globally fair' personal carbon allowance for next year is 3.8 tonnes – a challenging but not impossible target (visit www.fairsharesfairchoice.com/carbon_calculator.asp to work out your current carbon footprint). To mark COP15, Sustainability South West has exclusively launched 2010 promotional Carbon Cards – which are free to all supporters.



The personal 'Fair Share' gives us a realistic idea of how out of sync some current lifestyle choices and patterns are – from frequent flying and increased reliance on imported goods to planning new car-based developments. It also highlights the changes we all need to make if we are serious about averting the extremes of climate change.

FSFC doesn't short change the less well-off or climate safety (the formula aims to keep global temperature rise to within a 2 degree increase). It is based on the principles of an internationally recognised model - the UN backed 'Contraction and Convergence.' It calculates per capita carbon budgets which take account of the different needs of developed and developing nations.

Whatever the outcome of Copenhagen **you** can choose not to blow your carbon budget (as well as your financial one!) over the festive season. Making a New Year's resolution to tighten your carbon belt will help you make a smooth transition to the inevitable low carbon economy – whether the world chooses to be bold and embrace it now or balk at the challenge and face massive upheaval later down the line.

Applications can be submitted by a local community group, local authority, NGO, NHS Trust, private organisation or individual. New website 'Building a better South West' www.buildsw.org.uk has recently been developed by Constructing Excellence SW (CESW) and Future Foundations to provide a



fully comprehensive source for construction improvement in the SW. For use by those working in the sector and homeowners alike, the new website covers a wide range of topics, including a section on adapting to climate change http://buildsw.org.uk/climate_change. Future Foundations was set up in 2001 by Sustainability South West with the support of regional partners with the aim to normalise sustainable construction in the South West. The project has now become a joint initiative with CESW, an organisation which aims to drive change in construction and to improve industry performance in order to produce a better built environment.

Local and national award schemes have recognised South West businesses over the past month:

This year's winners are: Overall Winner - The Woolly Shepherd; Sustainable Devon award - Otter Brewery; Carbon Reduction award - Bandvulc Tyres; Environmental Goods & Services award - The Woolly Shepherd; Food and Farming award - Churston Traditional Farm Shop; Environmental Champion - John Hayward. The 7th Annual Cornwall Sustainability Awards have awarded one of Cornwall's oldest businesses, St Austell Brewery, the 'Overall Winner' as well as 'Best Managed Large Business' beating off competition from other category winners including Primrose Valley, Nature Paint, St Columb Minor School, MPAD and Trelowarren Estate.

A special award for Longstanding Commitment to Sustainability in Cornwall was also presented to Bedknobs B&B and Learn English in Cornwall in recognition for their consistent and long term work in promoting sustainability throughout the county. There's some good eating in Bristol: Sustainable restaurant Bordeaux Quay has been awarded Crackerjack Evening Post Restaurant of the Year as well as winning both the 'Food' and 'Dining Experience' categories and The Thali Café have been awarded 'Best Takeaway' at The Radio 4 Food and Farming Awards, a celebration of Britain's food heroes. The Thali Café was praised for their environmentally positive practices such as sourcing ingredients from nearby farms and their reusable stainless steel Tiffin take away containers.

👍 Digging up the press...

Musgrove Park Hospital in Taunton has been creating a stir and attracting local press, all keen to cover the hospital's new on-site allotments. The hospital has received coverage on the BBC Somerset website, an interview on BBC Radio Somerset and an upcoming piece in the Western Daily Press - all highlighting this fantastic story. Twelve plots have been dug out of disused land at the back of the hospital buildings with each plot looked after by teams made up of staff from different departments. Apart from fresh produce, the new project will improve biodiversity in the hospital grounds and will allow staff the chance to relax outside working hours. It is hoped the allotments will be ready for sowing early next year.

👍 Outdoor peeing could activate a composting revolution

Men are being encouraged to follow the example of National Trust property Wimpole Hall in Cambridgeshire whose gardeners are peeing on their compost when nature calls. Male urine (which is less acidic than female urine) activates the composting process to help to produce a ready supply of organic matter to add back to the garden - also saving the four to nine litres of water used by an average flush of a toilet. Wimpole Hall will have saved up to 30 per cent of its daily water use by not having to flush the loo so many times. 👎 Brits workplace wasters

A new survey by Tickbox.net/Opinion Matters showed that Brits are happy to recycle and follow green practices at home but leave their environmental conscience at the door when they arrive for work. For instance, just over 40% said they recycled plastics at home but not at work. Other poor workplace practices include unnecessarily printing out emails (21%) and putting recyclables into the non-recycling bin (21%). The impact isn't simply on the environment - Defra figures indicate that UK businesses could save £6.4 billion annually by implementing resource efficiency measures that are of no or very low cost. Simple steps such as turning down thermostats, turning off lights and addressing dripping taps can help businesses to save money and be more environmentally friendly. Furthermore, in today's increasingly environmentally aware society, these steps can have a positive knock on effect on corporate reputation and the way customers value a business.

A new online resource has been developed by South West Climate Change Impacts Partnership, in partnership with South West Tourism, Climate South East and Tourism South East, to help forward-looking businesses prepare for the effects of climate change. The toolkit, 'Preparing for change: climate-proof your tourism business', is structured around the impacts of floods, droughts and heatwaves – extreme weather events that are becoming more frequent as the climate changes. Each section tells how businesses might be affected, suggests practical actions to take, and guides to further information and support. Sustainable Cities Index 09



Forum for the Future's annual Sustainable Cities Index tracks progress on sustainability in Britain's 20 largest cities - highlighting their environmental performance, quality of life and their readiness for the challenges of the future. The index encourages healthy competition and is intended to stimulate discussion and give citizens the tools to hold their leaders to account. Bristol takes 1st place in the quality of life table and ranks 3rd on future-proofing. It also has the highest scores for recycling and household waste collections, and comes 2nd on employment and transport. But it is let down by some poorer performances on the environmental table. Plymouth falls from 3rd place last year to 12th this year, as it is the only city in the index to increase its ecological footprint over the last 12 months. 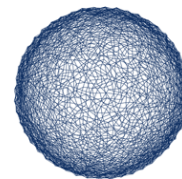
