The sustainable path to a resilient recovery

Recessions prompt a rethink about how we might improve our future approach. Since prevention is better than cure, investing in a *sustainable* approach to recovery now will reap a more resilient future.



Things have changed. At the start of the 21st Century, the global population is bursting at the seams; we are living way beyond the capacity of the earth's resources to support us and inequality is entrenched. A 20th century approach to recovery is obsolete.

A 21st century approach to recovery must recognise that our future survival depends on investing in 'the common social, economic and environmental good'. If we choose a recovery package that continues to invest in outmoded high carbon goods and services produced and delivered in ways that increase inequalities and depletes our vital natural resources - we are doomed. Pumping money into the production of high CO2 emitting vehicles is a massive lost cause.

So as the South West region begins work on a new single regional strategy – let it be properly fit for the challenges and opportunities of the 21st century. We need a sustainable regional plan which invests in a future which will see us healthy, productive, socially just and living within environmental limits. We are faced with big challenges on climate change and insecurities and price hikes on energy and food. Roll on new training and employment projects which provide local communities and businesses with low carbon connectivity, local safe and secure energy supplies, sustainable land management and more local sourcing of goods and services.

Now is the time to show leadership and support each other to try out more genuinely sustainable ways to develop – if not now when?

C+ Carbon Positive Awards 2009: Open for applications on 8 February



On Monday 9 February, the South West C+ Carbon Positive Awards opens for applications for its second year! The region wide award scheme is sponsored by the South West Regional Development Agency and supported by Sustainability South West, Business in the Community, Wessex Water, Viridor Waste Management, South West Water and Bristol Green Capital. The C+ Carbon Positive Awards recognise the businesses, organisations and communities taking a proactive and innovative low carbon approach to the ways in which we live and work and builds on the South West's growing reputation for ambition and excellence in achieving sustainable solutions. There are seven award categories (the first three recognising both large and small organisations):

- **Carbon Positive Footprints:** for organisations successfully cutting their carbon emissions
- **Carbon Positive Consumer Choices:** for organisations offering consumers more low carbon choices
- **Carbon Positive Cutting Edge:** for organisations developing innovative carbon cutting solutions
- **Carbon Positive Micro:** for exemplary low carbon businesses with five employees or less
- **Carbon Positive Communities:** for communities that are successfully reducing their carbon footprint
- **Carbon Positive Bristol Green Capital:** for any organisation in, or providing services to, the greater Bristol area that is able to demonstrate how they are working with either suppliers, employees or peers to positively influence and impact on climate change
- **Carbon Positive Pioneer:** the overall award winner – the business, organisation or community that is having the greatest impact on carbon reduction in the South West (*open to winners of the above categories*)

Health and Sustainability in the South West

The **NHS Carbon Reduction Strategy for England** was launched on 27 January 2009. It sets an ambition for the NHS to help drive change towards a low carbon society. The strategy shows the scale of reduction in carbon required for the NHS to progress towards the Climate Change Act requirements and recommends key actions for the NHS to become a leading sustainable and low carbon organisation. In the South West, the link between health and sustainability is being strengthened with a new **Strategic Health Authority funded role within SSW**. Lynn Gibbons will commence as 'Sustainable Health SW Manager' on 16 February and will work closely with the region's NHS Trusts to promote and support effective sustainable policy and practice, through the provision and development of guidance; networking and training events. Severn Tidal Power: consultation now open

A Severn Tidal Power 'Stakeholder event' was held in Bristol at the end of January. At the event it was confirmed that the official feasibility study will now continue into its second phase – a more detailed assessment of a 'shortlist' of five possible schemes. At the same time, funding was promised to allow other 'innovative' ideas put forward more recently to further develop their proposals for consideration. The event also marked the start of a three month consultation which will canvass views on:

- the schemes currently on the shortlist;
- the scope of the Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) that is being carried out;
- the issues being considered by the feasibility study, and how they are being approached.

SSW will be making its own submission to the consultation, guided by the Regional Sustainable Development Framework, the 'Sustainability Shaper' (www.shapersw.net).
