Planting Places... How 'green' does our region grow?

A report from Planting Places – still cultivating local green space

In 2006, following feedback that the broader sustainability benefits of green spaces were underappreciated by decision makers, SSW established the Planting Places project to raise the profile of green infrastructure (GI) within the region.

Four years on, the project is still going strong. It has organised an annual award scheme showcasing the green spaces that are making fantastic contributions to community sustainability (first run in 2008); run an expert GI masterclass series with Natural England; and, most recently, produced a Briefing Note outlining the potential of urban green infrastructure networks. The Briefing Note provides an accessible overview of the links between GI and sustainability – useful 'ammunition' for those stressing the importance of multifunctional GI within development plans (visit www.sustainabilitysouthwest.org.uk/projects/planting_places/ to download the Briefing Note or contact us on 0117 929 0989 for a paper copy).



More generally Planting Places has provided a forum for practitioners and experts from a range of sectors – covering health, play, heritage, travel and access, biodiversity, climate change adaptation and mitigation and 'one planet' lifestyles – to exchange ideas and information with the mutual benefit of developing more integrated approaches. Using green infrastructure to join up the dots has highlighted that most of us are aiming for the same thing; thriving, resource efficient communities supported by a healthier environment (i.e. sustainability!).

However, recent SSW research suggested that despite high knowledge of the sustainability potential of GI amongst practitioners, action is hampered by the lack of joined up thinking at the strategic and national level (something we stressed in a recent report to Defra). We hope that the increased focus on localism and explosion of community interest and involvement in green spaces is an opportunity for local agencies to build on the knowledge and best practice already available.

With the continued support of Natural England and the in-kind support of other partner organisations, Planting Places has big plans for the upcoming months. Next steps include the launch of our 2011 awards (details on how to apply will appear in our November issue of Sustainability Now) and further masterclasses in partnership

with Natural England. In particular, we look forward to working more closely with GreenSpace (SW) the regional network of local authority parks and green space professionals to better support community delivery of easily accessible, safe and attractive green spaces.

Work for a council? Training and support subsidy available from SSW

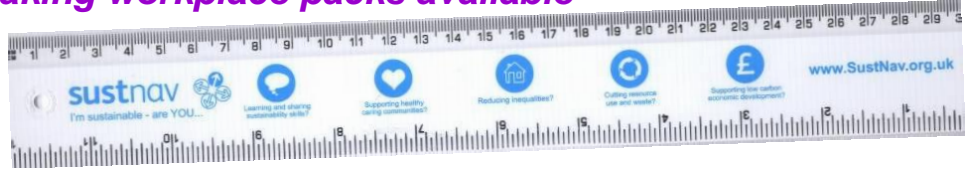
Sustainability South West (SSW) has been awarded **funding to work with up to five local authorities** in 2010-11, on a first come first served basis. The subsidy can be used for sustainability staff training (at both executive and officer level) and on the application of a sustainability framework to highlight compatibilities and incompatibilities across policy and delivery and identify opportunities for more integrated approaches. The programme can be tailored to suit the particular needs of your authority.

We understand that the forthcoming SR10 announcement will have significant impacts on local government. The combination of reducing financial resources with increasing pressure to improve public service delivery presents a tough challenge. The programme offered provides a framework for identifying the least sustainable activities (which can be prioritised for cost cutting) and could also help you to avoid policies which may prove to be costly – whether financially, socially or environmentally – in the long term.

Cycling accessibility project in Bristol A new cycling project for disabled adults and children has been launched by Bristol City Council and charity Cycling Projects. South West Awards for All grants A total of 55 SW organisations (nearly half based in Devon) have been awarded a total of £395,257 from the Awards for All fund. **Earthlinks UK** in Dartington gets £9,900 to encourage people to be greener and eat healthier foods with events to teach people about the benefits of climate friendly food. **Woolacombe Allotment and Garden Association** will use £9,500 to improve a community space used to grow organic fruit and vegetables for local residents and educate children about healthy living and the production of natural ingredients. **Shaftesbury Home Grown** in Dorset are awarded £10,000 to develop a social enterprise promoting local food production through the creation of a community farm for the benefit of local residents. Cycling impact A cycling programme led by the National Obesity Observatory and Sustrans with six UK towns, including Exeter in the South West, shows the positive impact an increase in cycling has on public health. Results show a 10% reduction in the number of people classified as physically inactive with cycling increasing an average of 27% in the six towns - growth rates similar to the most cycle-friendly European cities, and matching growth seen in London. 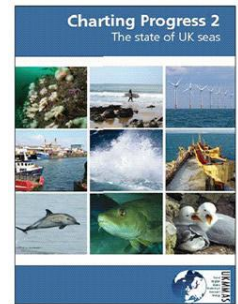


Beyond the Tipping Point film available for screenings
